

## Come and Sing

Elgar Sea Pictures

Arr. Christopher Phelps for choir and piano

Sea Pictures, Op. 37 is a song cycle by Sir Edward Elgar (1857-1934)

The songs performed are:

Sea Slumber Song by Roden Noel In Haven (Capri) by Caroline Alice Elgar Sabbath Morning at Sea by Elizabeth Barrett Browning Where Corals Lie by Richard Garnet The Swimmer by Adam Lindsay Gordon

Success came to Elgar relatively late. For his first 40 years he was virtually unknown outside the Midlands; it was only with the *Enigma Variations* and then *The Dream of Gerontius* that Elgar gained a national reputation. Perhaps as a result of frustration he would frequently insist that he had no interest in music. Indeed, in the last 14 years of his life Elgar composed very few major works.

Pre-dating *The Dream of Gerontius* by a year, *Sea Pictures* is, for the most part, a much more intimate affair, though the premiere in 1899 was enlivened by the soloist Clara Butt dressing up as a mermaid. The poems chosen by Elgar are not of the first order of greatness, but as the composer himself said, 'it is better to set the best second-rate poetry to music, for the most immortal verse *is* music already.' Poets throughout the ages – one thinks immediately of Coleridge and Whitman – speak of a journey of self-discovery told through metaphors of nature. The threat posed and the freedom offered by the sea was a common source of inspiration for writers at the turn of the century; 1899 also saw the publication of Kate Chopin's heart- and ground-breaking novel *The Awakening*, whose heroine would surely recognise Lindsay Gordon's *Swimmer* in her final scene.
